The Institute for Community Research cordially invites you to join us for a Traditional Arts Marketplace, where artists from countries such as Lithuania, Sri Lanka, Somalia, Burma, Iran, Iraq, Romania and Laos will demonstrate their crafts and sell their art work. Light refreshments will be available. Admission is free.

The Marketplace features carpet weavers, knitters, lace crochet artists, embroiderers, book illustrators, basket weavers, henna painting, and decorative artists representing several ethnic groups living in Connecticut. Many of the artists are members of the Sewing Circle Project, a successful initiative that encourages preservation, production, and marketing of traditional arts among local immigrant and refugee communities. The Sewing Circle Project is a collaboration of ICR's Connecticut Cultural Heritage Arts Program, the Hartford Public Library, and Catholic Charities Migration and Refugee Services.

The marketplace is held in conjunction with Hartford Open Studios Weekend, an exciting city-wide self-guided artists and artisans tour that offers a unique opportunity to meet some of the finest artists working in central Connecticut. www.openstudiohartford.com
